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
together we are Stronger

It is commonly attributed to the ancient Greek philosopher Aristotle, who first expressed the concept over 2,500 years ago. Joining or combining different parts or elements together often produces something much greater and stronger. Think about a rope. Each individual fiber is very weak. By itself, it can do little. And a haphazard pile of many weak fibers is little better. But twisting, weaving, or braiding thousands of such weak fibers together produces a rope strong enough to lift thousands of pounds.



The Speech and Language Program at The Joseph Sams School uses a Total Communication Approach. A total communication approach is all about using the right combination of communication tools for an individual to ensure the most successful forms of contact, information exchange, and conversation. We make use of various modes of communication to support our students' communication needs. This approach allows us to ensure that our students experience successful interactions with others so that they can build relationships using meaningful language in an intentional way. Language can be expressed in a myriad of ways. Across our school on any given day, you might witness students communicating using the Picture Exchange Communication System, verbal speech, sign language, gestures, and a variety of communication devices.







Our school has three Speech-Language Pathologists and two Speech-Language Pathology Assistants who serve our students. We collaborate with classroom teachers, fine arts staff, our physical therapy consultant, and outside therapists to ensure that our students are set up for communication success during the entire school day. We have the mindset at The Joseph Sams School that every moment is a teachable moment. Our staff targets communication from the second our students come into the building during morning carpool and it carries over for the rest of the school day, both on campus and in the community. Our staff finds great joy in watching a student's eyes light up using a device or when a preschool student waves for the first time. These are precious moments that are the result of meeting our students where they are and working consistently to support and equip them to participate in their environment in a meaningful way.

STUDENT # SPOTLIGHT

Anna Olson

Our fourteen-year journey with the Joseph Sams School has helped our daughter Anna develop new skills, become her own person, and expanded our family to include the school family. Anna joined the JSS family when she was six; today she is a vivacious twenty year old. She has a dual diagnosis of Williams Syndrome and autism. Along the way we have shared many special moments with Anna and the school. Here a just a few:

Learning skills by the day & in Life

Anna started her journey in communicating via introduction to the PECS system. PECS changed Anna's life and our family's life. For the first time she could tell us what she needed or wanted. It quickly became normal for Anna to routinely show us a picture of the beach to which the family response was 'yes Anna, we all want the beach right now'. When Anna was ten, a moment that we will never forget was when her teacher grabbed us one morning and said, "Follow me, I have something I want you to see." In the classroom Anna was seated in front of a computer. Her teacher said, 'Hey Anna, what is your name and where do you live?'. Anna proceeded to type her entire name and her address. Perfectly. We all cheered and cried. We still don't know who was more proud, her teacher or her parents. Today, Anna uses an iPad for communication in addition to a small verbal vocabulary. To learn another major life skill, the school guided us through potty training. Potty training a child with special needs is no small undertaking. The method, coaching, and ideas from the school accomplished the task with Anna faster than we could have ever imagined.

Meal time for Anna is an enormous challenge. She doesn't chew food, so all of her meals need to be puréed for her to eat. Through constant engagement with her teachers, Anna now feeds herself lunch and cleans up after herself. Anna's version of cleaning up is a version of the shot put. She seems to think walking calmly to the sink with her dishes and throwing them into the sink is hilarious. Her brother and sister think it is hilarious too. As parents we are thankful for her ability to feed herself and entertain the family at the same time.

The most amazing skill achievement to date (we know more are coming) has been Anna's ability to say 'No'. She didn't accomplish this until she was 17 years old. Imagine how hard it is to never truly understand if your child is in pain, sad, frightened, or hurting. Or, what does your child want, given all of the basic choices they face on a daily basis? Do you want to hear this, wear that, go here or do that? For 17 years Anna's answer was always 'yes.'

Then one day, she said 'no'. Our entire house stopped. We confirmed, Anna do you want dinner now? A very clear and decisive 'no' was delivered. We erupted in cheers and applause!

Helping the family is as important as helping your special needs child

Every parent of a special needs child realizes early on that surviving, let alone thriving, with a special needs child requires the love, patience, support, and investment of the extended family. Wisdom we received from JSS was that protecting and helping the family is as important as the development of the special needs child. The day trips with the school have helped Anna acclimate to the daily trips to the grocery store and riding in the cart (when she was young we left a cart full of food in the middle of the isle and walked out because of Anna's epic meltdown). Through a school trip, Anna visited Atlanta Symphony Hall. That allowed our family to do something special by attending ET, performed live by the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra. What a treasured family memory that we have the school to thank for!

A unique memory for our family was taking Anna to her Prom. Upon entering, Anna ran to the DJ, saw her friends and jumped with joy. We were astonished when she knew the words to almost all of the songs! We ran to her teacher and said 'What?!?!?!" And nonchalantly she said 'Oh yeah, she loves I heart Radio' and giggled. We had a ball dancing and singing that evening.

Through the school we have become closer to other parents, staff, school administration and the Fayette County community. One evening at a fundraising event we bumped into friends of ours that didn't know we had a child with special needs. The blending of our life with Anna into our life in the community has been one of the most healing and supportive effects of the Joseph Sams School.

Anna lives a life of joy and normalcy and her family does the same. All of it is a gift from the Joseph Sams School.

Some people call them Teachers, we call them Our Gift

When Anna was eleven, she had a case of life-threatening scoliosis. During her surgery and recovery, teachers came to see Anna. Her music therapist came to our home and would play guitar for Anna. The first day Anna sat upright in a chair and smiled was a victory not just for her parents but for the teachers of the Joseph Sams School. Their love helped her heal.

For three days every year, Anna's teachers take her to camp. This year was a special one. After a couple of years of climbing the zipline tower only to climb down, Anna did the zipline! That high five with her teacher after watching the video when we picked her up was heart-warming.

The teachers and staff's commitment to Covid safety exceeds anything we have seen or experienced in our society. They hold themselves to a different standard of behavior and safety, often at significant personal cost and inconvenience in their personal lives. This is all to keep our children safe. We admire and salute the professionalism, discipline, and fortitude of the entire team at the Joseph Sams School.

STUDENT #2 | Wesley Bauhan

Wesley has genuinely made such amazing progress I do not think would have happened in a different environment.

I always found it fascinating that Wesley, my second born was such a "good baby". And by good, I mean...he was really, really good. Even in the hospital after his birth he barely cried while I heard all the other babies screaming at various times in other rooms. I can count on ONE hand the amount of times he got upset when I would put him down for naps or to go to sleep at night between the ages of 1 and 3. He was perfect, smiling at everything and an overall goofball. This was such a welcomed improvement after my first son had been a more, let's say, difficult baby. When Wesley turned 2 and still had not started talking, I began to worry. He didn't seem like he was picking up language skills, both receptively or expressively like his peers. For a while we thought he just couldn't understand, or maybe hear well and that he would catch up. But a year went by, still no talking and a major deficit in understanding. We scheduled a meeting with a neuropsychologist to finally get some answers. Even to her, he was a bit of an unusual case and she wasn't comfortable diagnosing him yet with autism. Instead, he received a diagnosis of global developmental delay, expressive and receptive language disorder and severe childhood apraxia of speech. An appointment was made at Scottish Rite to evaluate him for an AAC device which he qualified for with flying colors. We started him in the public school special needs program the day he turned 3, but immediately started researching other options because we wanted to find the perfect place for our son to thrive. In public school, they loved on him, but were trying to force academic skills that he simply wasn't ready for yet. I still had a feeling he was not processing the receptive language input like he should be and was getting frustrated. We had heard about the Joseph Sams School through an on-line support group for special needs parents. We weren't sure at the time it would be the right fit but scheduled a tour. Once we were there it not only felt like the perfect fit, but we were ready to immediately make the move. Looking back, this was the best decision we have made for Wesley to date. Not only does he jump out of the car every day ready and excited to be at school, he has genuinely made such amazing progress I do not think would have happened in a different environment. His first word was at 4.5 years old..."Mama". He didn't say anything else until 6 and then suddenly something clicked, and he tries to say anything you ask him to! I am just stunned by his progress, his positive attitude and all the teachers at JSS. Every teacher knows him by name and gets excited to hear his voice. They ALL push him to speak and I know this contributes to the success we have seen the last year in his language growth. I know in a large public school there is no way every teacher would know the specifics of our Wesley.



Another wonderful thing about the JSS program is the ability for me as a parent to have input on his IEP. We can ask for certain things for Wesley that the public school system would not have considered. At JSS they work with him on his speaking device, but the second I said I wanted to force language more, they agreed, and truly push him to speak at all times and not always rely on the device. Not everything has to be about academics. No school understands this better and I will be forever grateful.

Wesley is thriving, and I mean thriving. He is so happy and joyful, and that for me is truly the most important thing. For the staff at JSS to let Wesley, and all the kids enjoy true happiness while also teaching them to interact with this world, both academically and in ways that emotionally keep them happy is more than I can ask for. We are so pleased with our decision to send Wesley to JSS and don't think we will ever be looking back.

Although scholarship donations are made at different times throughout the year, The Circle of Hope members continue to provide the bulk of our needs-based scholarship donations. The Circle of Hope is a Giving Society that was created in 2008 to help ensure that we had enough funding to be able to award scholarship monies to students whose families qualified for needs-based financial assistance with their annual tuition.

Since its inception in 2008, The Circle of Hope members, and the Friends of the Circle of Hope (donors who make a straight cash donation less than \$1,000 to this fund), have provided over \$1.6 million in scholarship funding and have cumulatively provided 390 scholarships to JSS students and families who qualify for need-based assistance.
